## HUDSONVILLE COMMUNITY FAIR YOUTH CLUB GUIDELINES

1. Entry in this division is limited to members of a Hudsonville Community Fair registered youth club. Members must be at least 5 years of age and no older than 19 years of age as of January 1<sup>st</sup> except where otherwise specified. An enrollment form for each individual member must be turned in to the fair office by March 1. (see website for enrollment form).
2. Clubs must have completed enrollment to Hudsonville Community Fair by January 1. (see website for registration form). An eligible club must consist of at least 1 leader, 2 families, 5+ members. The club must be located in Ottawa County. (Participation is contingent on approval from Hudsonville Community Fair).
3. All previous awards and identifications must be removed before judging or may forfeit premiums (unless notebook requirements specify they be present).
4. All entries and exhibits must meet project guidelines and adhere to policies established by the Hudsonville Community Fair. See project coordinator for a complete policy statement.
5. Exhibits must be the work of the youth. Only work completed within one year previous to the fair will be judged.
6. No entry fee is charged for exhibits.
7. Judging will be held according to the schedule listed.
8. All judging in the youth club division will be done on the group system. Each exhibit will be placed within a group A-B-C (unless otherwise specified). Grades and purebreds animals will show in the same class unless otherwise specified. Entries for 5-7 year olds in some departments will be considered pee-wee and may be paid premiums (see individual departments).
9. No exhibitor or parent of an exhibitor will be allowed to interfere with the judging committee. Anyone so interfering may forfeit his/her premium and the exhibit(s) may be removed from the grounds.
10. Approved youth club leaders having clubs showing animal projects at the Hudsonville Fair can obtain a weekly pass at the fair office for entrance to the fairgrounds. Parents of members with animal projects staying on the grounds may purchase an all-week pass from the fair office.
11. The Youth Club leaders, FFA advisor, and those in charge of the fair assume no responsibility for damage or loss of animals or exhibits, but will do all possible to provide good quarters and protection while the exhibits are on display.
12. If participating in youth club classes, animals must be exhibited in the youth division and conform to the health requirements of the governing fair. If you have concerns about the health of an animal please contact the respective species superintendent.
13. No exhibit shall be released until the time specified by the fair officials as shown in premium book for that department. Removing the exhibit early may forfeit premiums.
14. All animal projects must be recorded in the Hudsonville fair office as specified by project guidelines to participate in a current year fair.

15. Conduct policy: Any youth club member, leader, parent or guest participating in a Hudsonville Community Fair sponsored activity is expected to demonstrate respectful language/behavior and are responsible for the care of their project animal(s) and/or pens (rabbits and chickens excluded). Acts of theft or vandalism, possession of controlled substance or alcohol, or who is involved in any other such offense will also not be tolerated. Failure to comply with conduct policy may result in being immediately sent home along with their project animal (except for hogs will be shipped for slaughter and sold at market price at his/her expense) or may lose future privileges of being involved at the Hudsonville Community Fair (this will be determined by Hudsonville Community Fair Animal Project Committee/Fair Board). Premiums will be forfeited.
16. All Fair Animal project committees and club leaders, and the Project Superintendents will enforce all guidelines listed in the fair book.
17. Project Superintendents must gain approval from fair secretary or president prior to removing entries or participants from the show.
18. Participation in the Market Livestock Auction is limited to members of Hudsonville Community Fair approved youth clubs and animals must be housed in fair barns for the week of the fair. Pens will be allotted in accordance with Hudsonville Livestock Committee lottery rules.
19. Participation is available to all without regard to race, color, national origin, gender, gender identity, religion, age, height, weight, disability, political beliefs, sexual orientation, marital status, family status or veteran status.
20. No more than one entry per member per class. Still exhibits are unlimited.

## **HOW TO ENTER YOUR EXHIBIT AT THE FAIR**

**Youth Clubs Members** –must use exhibitor entry form to pre-register entries by August 1. Please use the Hudsonville Community Fair youth exhibitor number assigned to you by the fair secretary. Send your entry to Hudsonville Community Fair, PO Box 189, Hudsonville, MI 49426. Please mark youth club name under your return address on the envelope.

1. All **Youth clubs** exhibits **MUST** be pre-registered by August 1.
2. Still exhibits are unlimited **but may only enter one entry per class.**
3. Still exhibit judging will take place on Friday night. Entries may be dropped off from 5:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. All members with their projects in hand shall report to building #10 for judging. No exhibitor or parent of an exhibitor will be allowed to interfere with the judging committee. Anyone so interfering may forfeit his/her premium and the exhibit(s) may be removed from the grounds.
4. Still exhibits must be checked in at registration table by the **Youth Club** member. If the Club member is unable to bring in their own items, they must obtain a release form from the Fair office/website that must be signed by parent/legal guardian and youth club leader with stated reason.
5. Your still exhibits will be taken to the back to be judged and placed in your club booth after judging.
6. Still exhibits may not be removed from the exhibit barns until Sunday after the fair from 1 to 4 p.m. or Monday after the fair from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. Removing exhibit early may disqualify the item and result in forfeit of premiums.
7. The premium checks will be distributed to your club leader after the fair during pick up times listed above (see #6). Checks will not be mailed.

### **Youth Club Booth**

1. Each **Youth Club** will display all members' still projects in club booth. More booths may be requested for clubs with a large number of members/crafts. Booths can be reserved through Fair Youth Clubs Coordinator.
2. Each club must reserve a booth space by August 1<sup>st</sup>. NOTE: Clubs without reservations may not have a place to display their items. Clubs requesting a booth and not using it will be assessed a \$100 fee.
3. Three-sided booths will be provided. Each will be 8' x 4' deep.
4. It will be the responsibility of each club to arrange the project items for display in their booth. The judging of the project item will be completed before the item is taken to the club's booth for display.
5. The design of the display and all materials needed are to be provided by each **Youth Club**. (I.E. wall coverings, hooks, shelving, lines for hanging items, etc.)
6. Each club or committee may enter their completed booth as a display (Class 9912) and receive a premium. These club entries will be judged on neatness and originality. **The club exhibit card MUST be visible on the display before judging and the club leader MUST fill out a premium sheet.**
7. Access to the booth area for set up of booths will be available as follows:  
     Saturday – 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.  
     Monday – 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.



**Open Class Exhibitors** (adults and youth not participating in youth club classes) – must use the First letter of your Last Name and the Last Four numbers of your Social Security Number as your entry number. This will be your Permanent Entry Number for all future fairs also. Entry forms for pre-registering rabbits, chickens and dairy must be received by Monday before the fair and can be sent to Hudsonville Community Fair, PO Box 189, Hudsonville, MI 49426.

1. Bring your still exhibit to the fair on the Saturday before the first day of the fair. Open registration is 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. **One entry per class number in departments 40-72.**
2. Premium sheets (entry forms) for Open Class Departments 40-72 must be submitted at item drop-off. (Any exhibitor premium sheets for these classes that are turned in to the fair office prior to this will not be accepted and will need to be re-submitted.)
3. A clerk will enter your exhibit, giving you an exhibitor's tag which you attach to each of your exhibits. You remove the bottom portion of the tag for your claim check.
4. Your exhibit will now be placed on display.
5. Judging is scheduled for Saturday evening before the fair, unless otherwise stated.
6. The premium checks will be distributed either the Sunday after the fair from 1 to 4 p.m. or Monday after the fair from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. along with your still exhibits. (Please refer to posted pick up times for Antique Department items)
7. Refer to department in premium book for animal exhibit drop off and pick up times.
8. Removing your exhibit early may disqualify the item and result in forfeit of premiums.

### **Hudsonville Fair Association - Hudsonville Community Fair Rules and Regulations**

1. All still exhibits must be in place for exhibition at times designated by department.
2. Ribbons or Rosettes shall be awarded to premium winners in all classes.
3. **RESPONSIBILITY** – The board will not be responsible for any loss, damage or injury to any animal exhibited or for any article of any kind or nature.
4. All protests must be in writing with a \$100 fee, and made to the Chairman before the close of the fair. Any appeals must be made to the MDA within 45 days.
5. All protests with regards to market livestock weights must be filed in the fair office by 2:00 pm on the day following weigh-in. Ten random selected projects of the same species will also be weighed to determine average weight loss in settling disputes.
6. No exhibitor or parent of an exhibitor will be allowed to interfere with the judging committee. Anyone so interfering will forfeit his/her premium and the exhibit(s) may be removed from the grounds.
7. No premium shall be awarded by a committee unless the animal or article is worthy.
8. If any person acts as judge in any department of which he is an exhibitor, he shall forfeit such premiums as shall be awarded him on such articles.
9. No loose animals will be allowed on grounds.
10. Fair Board reserves the right to withhold premiums in all cases of fraud or violation of rules.
11. The fair board will not pay any premiums on articles or animals not mentioned in the Premium Book, and the Secretary has no authority to receive entries for anything not printed in the list.
12. Premiums shall be paid according to the judging sheets.
13. Persons having claims against the Association must present them to the Secretary at the close of the fair, in order that they may be examined by the first meeting of the Board after the fair.
14. No ribbons or trophies from any previous show shall be attached to any entry before judging is completed.
15. Each exhibitor is eligible to receive one premium in any class except for departments 11, 13, 103, 104, and 105.
16. No soliciting on the grounds.
17. No smoking within 25 feet of any building.
18. All protest for racing, horse pulling, tractor pulling, pickup pulling, and demolition derby must be made in writing with a \$100 fee before the completion of the event with the chairman of the event.
19. Market Livestock entries will be limited to the space available in youth club sections.
20. Fair Board may require SS# on entry form.
21. The Hudsonville Community Fair reserves the right to drug test any or all animals entered in the Hudsonville Community Fair if deemed necessary by filing of an official complaint by the Fair Board, a Leader or an Exhibitor. The expense of the drug test shall go to the person(s) owning the animal(s) if the test results show proof of improper use of drugs. They will also result in loss of any premiums by the exhibitor, and in the case of the sale of the animal the sale will be voided and owner responsible for proper and legal disposal of animal. If the test is negative the complainant will be responsible for testing fees.

## Hudsonville Community Fair Youth Clubs Super Showmanship Rules

**Score sheet:** The score sheet will have a scale of five for each category, except ability of exhibitor and show technique which will have ten points each. Score sheets to be provided by the fair office.

1. **Winning:** A member may only win Super Showmanship in Ottawa County once per year.
2. **Judges:** All judges must be at least 18 years of age. It is recommended that judges not be related to the participants in the show.
  - Experienced youth club members who are 17 may assist an adult in judging.
  - Experienced youth club members who are 18 and have assisted in judging in the past may judge.
  - Experienced youth club members who are 19 may judge.
3. **Classes:** All classes to be divided by the age of the members. Members are to go in the age appropriate class (not necessarily the same class they won in with their regular showmanship class).
  - **Junior** – 8, 9, 10 and 11 (no big beef will be shown)
  - **Intermediate** – 12, 13, and 14
  - **Senior** – 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19
4. **Eligibility:** The first showmanship contest that a member wins is **THE** species the member is eligible to show in super. No passing down the first animal to the second places winner (unless the member is not going to compete in the contest at all). The second species of showmanship that a member wins in must be passed down to the second place winner (and passed to the third if the second place winner has already qualified).
5. **Questions:** Questions asked during the event are to be general knowledge, easy for members to find, and age appropriate.
6. **Sportsmanship:** All rules of conduct will apply including those of sportsmanship before, during, and after the contest.
7. **Animals:** Animals for super showmanship should be manageable and easily shown. Safety of members is of primary consideration. Project coordinator will have the final decision on animals. Animals should not be switched during a class but rather should be switched between classes. No dairy animal may be used in the junior member division that is older than a junior yearling heifer.
8. **Appearance:** No sandals, canvas shoes, no open toes or open heels. No bare midribs or halter tops. Only the **first** judge will give a score for appearance.
9. **Ability with animal:** Interaction of the member and the animal and the member's ability to read the animal, and approach it so that it can be worked with. (Interaction and control of the animal) **This item is worth ten points**
10. **Show technique:** Knowledge of correct show methods and technical aspect of the animal, maneuvers, patterns, proper display of animal. **This item is worth ten points.**
11. **Dropped Scores:** The Super Showmanship coordinators will **not** drop the low score of any member in calculating the results.

# Department 1 – OPEN CLASS – DAIRY

All Trucks, Cattle Trucks use 40<sup>th</sup> Avenue Entrance - Release time from barns at time permitted by the fairboard. Leaving early may result in forfeit of premiums.

## Rules:

1. No animal shall be entered in more than one class, or compete for more than one premium, except for herd.
2. Feed for animals exhibited at the fair must be furnished by the exhibitors.
3. Dairy Cattle MUST be registered or eligible I.D. grades. Proof of registration/eligible I.D. grades required to be shown to superintendent.
4. Entries must be at the fair by Monday at 11:00 AM
5. **Animals must be pre-registered in fair office by August 1. Spaces will be allotted as available.**
6. Twin animals must be entered under separate exhibitor names for premium sheets.
7. Must have a minimum of 2 calves/heifers within the same breed to have a Junior Champion.
8. Must have a minimum of 2 cows within the same breed to have a Senior Champion.
9. Must have a Junior Champion and Senior Champion of the same breed to have a Grand Champion.
10. Any animal with signs of ring worm and/or pink eye will be sent home immediately.

### Rules:

1. Check-in is Monday of fair 10am-12pm. Check out is Saturday 6:30pm-10pm. Enter in at camping entrance (Gate F) for pick up at check out.
2. **Birds must be pre-registered in fair office by** Monday prior to the fair. Fair board reserves the right to limit the number of birds as space permits
3. Sick poultry MUST NOT be brought on the grounds, and poultry showing signs of disease MUST be removed from the grounds.
4. All birds must be the bonafide property of the exhibitor at the time of making the entry.
5. Revised Rules of the American Standard of Perfection as authority in competition. Poultry will be judged by APA/ABA standards.
6. Breeds not listed in book, will not receive premiums.
7. Health checks will be done on Monday of the fair by the fair at no charge before birds can be placed in the barn. Pullorum testing times are 10am -12 pm.
8. Fair board supplies feed for poultry. Superintendent will water and feed during fair.
9. All birds coming to Fair must **not** be vaccinated for (ILT) Infectious Laryngotracheitis
10. It is recommended that all birds be dusted with a pesticide before and after the fair. Pesticide dust will be available at check-in as an additional option. Any birds showing signs of parasites, illness, or disease will be removed from barn immediately.

#### Rules:

1. Fall of the rider or horse shall disqualify the entry when fall of horse or rider occurs while being timed on course. Rider has fallen when he/she is separated from his/her horse (which has not fallen) in such a way as to necessitate remounting or vaulting in to the saddle. Horse has fallen when its shoulder and haunch on the same side touch the ground or touch an obstacle and the ground.
2. The rider shall dismount and lead their horse out of the arena. The use of the header while mounting inside the arena at the gate area is allowed.
3. Going off-pattern will result in disqualification.
4. If starting keg, drum or cone is knocked over, rider will be disqualified.
5. Spurring or kicking in front of the cinch or girth, will cause disqualification. Excessive spurring/kicking while the rider's feet are in or out of the stirrups will cause disqualification at the judge's discretion.
6. Spur or spurring is defined as: a pointed device fastened to the back of a rider's boot or used to urge a horse on with spurs.
7. Kicking is defined as: to strike out or hit with the foot (with nothing attached to the boot).
8. The judge, at his/her discretion, may disqualify a rider for excessive use of a bat, crop or whip.
9. Excessive is defined as: more than usual, acceptable or needed.
10. The flag race will be timed from when the horse's first leg crosses the time line until the first leg returns across the line.
11. There will be very limited arena grooming.
12. MIHA rules and patterns will apply as appropriate.
13. The race classes will be divided by the age of the rider on day of the show.
14. A rider may enter 2 horses in a class but may only place with one horse (2<sup>nd</sup> horse is for a non-timed ride). Rider must decide prior to start of show which horse will be contested for scored ride.
15. If all classes are not entered before the show is started, an exhibitor may enter an additional class but it must be entered at least one full class before the class they wish to add
16. A horse may only be shared between immediate family members.
17. Pee Wee riders may be assisted in the arena by adult on the ground with either a lead line or with verbal/directional cueing.
18. A rider may either ride in age group or in draft class per event, may not ride in both.
19. Helmet is required by rider if under age of 18.

**If signed up for these classes on premium form by Thursday prior to the show, entry fee is waived. If signing up on day of show, it is a \$3 entry fee per class.**

# Youth Clubs

## **Market Livestock General Rules**

Applies to Department 4, 6 and 10

1. It is the market livestock club member and their family's responsibility to read, understand and abide by all Club Rules/Policies, Market Livestock Rules and Hudsonville Community Fair Youth Club Guidelines. Failure to abide by these rules and guidelines may result in disciplinary action up to disqualification from market livestock events at the Hudsonville Community Fair.
2. All market livestock club members and their parents/guardians/sponsors must complete and sign the appropriate species-related Hudsonville Livestock Committee Market Livestock Declaration Form(s) before tagging in a market livestock project for the Hudsonville Community Fair (refer to the declarations forms for instructions and deadlines).
3. To be eligible to complete any market livestock project, youth must meet all club and fair requirements and be an active member of an approved market livestock club of the Hudsonville Community Fair. Member eligibility shall be determined by August 1.
4. All market livestock club members must complete a yearly project notebook or project record book and YQCA Training to show and sell their market livestock project at the Hudsonville Community Fair (refer to the Market Livestock Notebook & Project Record Book Guidelines). Each project book must be judged according to the Hudsonville Fair guidelines. Without the book, the project will not be weighed, judged or sold. The book must be on display in the club booth or the notebook area in accordance with Youth Club Member Exhibit Guideline. Failure to have a project book on display will disqualify a market livestock project and the member will not receive any premiums.
5. Dress code for showing and selling market livestock shall be as follows: General - neat and attractive jeans or dress pant, neat and professional dress shirt without writing. No ball caps (neat and professional cowboy hats are acceptable). Footwear - leather shoes or boots preferred, must be close-toed appropriate footwear. While in the barns, shoes must be worn at all times for the member's protection.
6. Showmanship classes are for market livestock animals only. All market livestock club members must show their own project animal in showmanship and all assigned market classes at the Hudsonville Community Fair. All market livestock animals exhibited at the fair must sell in the Hudsonville Livestock Auction.
7. All market livestock animals must be beyond the withdrawal periods of any and all medications in order to show and sell. All market livestock members will be responsible for properly caring for their animals during the entire week of the fair by properly feeding, watering, and cleaning up after them (refer to the Pen Policy). After all the livestock animals are removed from the barns at the conclusion of the week, a thorough cleaning of the housing facilities is mandatory or a charge for cleaning will be assessed accordingly.
8. A market livestock member may show, and is limited to two different market project species state-wide each year which can only include one bovine (beef or dairy feeder calf) project. Market livestock members are not allowed to participate in any other fair state-wide with the same market project species (lamb, hog, dairy feeder calf, or beef) within the same year.
9. Once a project animal is on the fairgrounds, there will be no outside help allowed with the fitting of the animal except immediate family members, market livestock club leaders, or club members from the Hudsonville Community Fair.
10. Any market livestock animal(s) deemed non-sellable must be removed from the fairgrounds within 24 hours of notification, but no later than Friday by noon.
11. No member of the Hudsonville Fair Board, the Hudsonville Livestock Committee, or any market livestock club leaders will be held responsible for accident or injury to a market livestock member or project animal.
12. The Hudsonville Livestock Committee, with the Hudsonville Fair Board veterinarian will decide what market livestock animals, if any, need to be rejected. The Hudsonville Livestock Committee will also have the authority to send home any market livestock member who violates any of the rules, if deemed necessary, subject to Hudsonville Fair Board approval.
13. The Market Livestock Auction checks and buyer and add-a-bid lists will be handed out by club leaders at a designated time only after buyer payments have been received and not before.
14. Each market livestock animal will be weighed in for the Hudsonville Community Fair on a date and time selected by the Hudsonville Livestock Committee. If requested, an animal may be allowed one immediate re-weigh as long as the animal has not left the weigh in area.
15. If you have animal health concerns, the respective species superintendent should be contacted immediately.
16. Failure to comply with any guidelines, rules or regulations put in place by the member's club, the Hudsonville Community Fair and the Hudsonville Livestock Committee may be cause for disqualification from participating in the Hudsonville Community Fair.

## Department 2 – YOUTH CLUBS DAIRY

**No entries released until 6:30 pm Saturday (leaving early forfeits premiums)**

Dairy Project Guidelines – Dairy committee

- Animals must be on grounds by 11:00 am on Monday of the fair. Release Time is 6:30 pm on Saturday (**leaving early forfeits premiums**)
- Members must be 8 years old by January 1<sup>st</sup> and can be in the dairy program until they are 19 on January 1<sup>st</sup>. They must be enrolled with the Hudsonville fair office by March 1<sup>st</sup> of the project year.
- First year members 11 and under may show only one animal at any fair in the county or at all three fairs if they so desire. They must start out with an animal no older than a spring yearling. After the first year they may show more than one animal, but never more than they can care for through the whole week of the fair. This means keeping the animals watered, fed and clean.
- For show day, a white collared shirt with sleeves required, white pants recommended. Be neat and clean in overall appearance. Leather shoes or boots are required for your safety. No tennis shoes, please!
- Exhibitors must know the actual birth date of their animal and be able to prove it.
- Any animal with signs of ring worm and/or pink eye will be sent home immediately.
- All youth club members are required to show their project animal in showmanship breed class in order to receive premiums. The same person must show the same animal in showmanship and breed class.
- No swearing or loud radios allowed.
- Once the animal is on the grounds, there will be NO outside help allowed with the fitting and/or preparation of the animal for the show except immediate family members, club leaders or other club members.
- No underage smoking, alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs or sedatives will be allowed for youth club members. No alcoholic beverages, illegal drugs or sedatives will be allowed for project animals.
- If any rule 8-10 is violated, punishment may be:
  - Parent will be notified
  - Member asked to leave
  - Animals sent home
  - Will not be able to show this year or next year
- Classes may be combined at the discretion of the Dairy Coordinator.

Class 8321 Dairy Club Herd

Each club or FFA Chapter may show one dairy club herd consisting of four animals of any breed or age shown by at least two members of the same club/chapter. No more than two animals may be shown by the same member. Each club/chapter is allowed one herdsman in the ring. If the membership of the club/chapter is less than five members, two additional members may be borrowed from another club/chapter to show the club herd. No parents or leaders are allowed in the ring during the judging of the club herd. All persons showing the club herd must be youth club or FFA members.

## Department 4 – YOUTH CLUBS MARKET BEEF

See Market Livestock General Rules.

**All Trucks, Cattle Trucks use 40<sup>th</sup> Avenue Entrance – You may bring in market beef and feeder calf exhibits Sunday of fair during hours of 5:30 P.M. to 8:30 P.M. or on Monday of fair per livestock committee instructions. No Entries released until Saturday. (leaving early forfeits premiums)**

**Learning Objective:** To encourage youth to develop and enhance their skills and knowledge in animal science.

### Section 1 - BEEF

1. These rules are in addition to the Market Livestock General Rules and Youth Club Guidelines.
2. A market livestock club member must be 9-19 years old by January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current fair year to complete a beef project. Pen availability is limited and there may be a waiting list to show and sell a beef project at the Hudsonville Community Fair (refer to the Hudsonville Livestock Lottery Rules).
3. All animals must be castrated and dehorned at the time of tagging. In case of regrowth, absolutely no horns or scurs longer than ½" will be allowed at the fair weigh-in.
4. All beef will need proof of being tagged by a specific date/time. Fair tags will be provided by the Hudsonville Livestock Committee. Beef will have the option to be weighed in at a specified time. Only those that participate in the optional weigh in are eligible for the rate of gain class. All beef are required to have an RFID tag in order to show and sell at the Hudsonville Community Fair. RFID tags are the responsibility of the livestock club member. RFID & fair tags are to be the only tags in your projects ears and they must be in place before unloading your beef project at the fair.
5. A market livestock member may tag in a minimum of one beef or a maximum of two beef, but only one beef animal per member can be weighed in at fair to be shown and sold.
6. The beef project may be colored steers, colored heifers or dairy steers. Dairy steers must be 100% recognized dairy breed(s) (Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey or Milking Shorthorn). Beef/dairy beef crossbreeds will be shown as colored beef.
7. If a family has more than one market livestock member showing beef, they may tag in a spare for all immediate family members which must be designated at tag-in. If a family is going to have more than one spare beef for multiple family members, each spare must be designated to specific family members. In no case shall the total number of beef (including a spare) be more than two per member.

8. Beef must weigh 900 lbs. or more to show and sell at the Hudsonville Community Fair. Beef that meet the specified weight requirements will be shown and sold based on their live weight at the time of fair weigh-in.
9. Any beef animal that does not meet the specified weight requirements will not be shown or sold at the Hudsonville Community Fair. Underweight beef will be sent home immediately, and the livestock member will be responsible for transporting those animals off the grounds and for their sale and/or processing arrangements. It is suggested that feeder calves be born around April 15 of the current fair year to obtain the proper fair weight requirements.
10. All beef must be double tied with one halter and one neck rope while in their pens.
11. No butt fans or tack boxes are allowed in the beef barn.
12. Beef animals are not allowed to leave the grounds prior to the time posted by the Hudsonville Fair Board. All transportation of beef must be coordinated with the Hudsonville Livestock Committee. All beef animals must be signed out by the hauler and a designated representative of the committee prior to leaving the grounds.

## **Section 2 – DAIRY FEEDER CALF**

1. These rules are in addition to the Market Livestock General Rules & Youth Club Guidelines.
2. Dairy feeder calf classes are limited to junior showmen only. A market livestock club member must be 8-11 years old by January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current fair year to complete a dairy feeder calf project. The overall dairy feeder calf junior showmanship winner is eligible for Super Showmanship. Pen availability is limited and there may be a waiting list to show and sell a dairy feeder calf project at the Hudsonville Community Fair (refer to the Hudsonville Livestock Lottery Rules).
- 3 All dairy feeder calves must be vaccinated per the guidelines set by the Hudsonville Livestock Committee based off current recommendations by a local veterinarian All dairy feeder calf members must submit a signed affidavit, prior to weighing in, stating that their calf has been properly vaccinated.
4. All dairy feeder calves must be castrated and dehorned at the time of tagging. In case of regrowth, absolutely no horns or scurs longer than ½" will be allowed at the fair weigh-in.
5. All dairy feeder calves will need proof of being tagged by a specific date/time. Fair tags will be provided by the Hudsonville Livestock Committee. All dairy feeder calves are required to have an RFID tag in order to show and sell at the Hudsonville Community Fair. RFID tags are the responsibility of the livestock club member. RFID and air tags are to be the only tags in your projects ears and must be in place before unloading your feeder calf project at the fair.
6. The dairy feeder calf project must be dairy steer only. Dairy feeder calves must be from a recognized Dairy Breed (Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey, or Milking Shorthorn). Beef/dairy beef crossbreeds are not eligible to show.
7. A market livestock member may tag in a minimum of one dairy feeder calf or a maximum of two dairy feeder calves and only one dairy feeder calf per member can be weighed in at fair to be shown and sold.
8. If a family has more than one market livestock member showing dairy feeder calves, they may tag in a spare for all immediate family members which must be designated at tag-in. If a family is going to have more than one spare dairy feeder calf for multiple family members, each spare must be designated to specific family members. In no case shall the total number of dairy feeder calves (including a spare) be more than two per member.
9. Dairy feeder calves must weigh between 300 lbs. and 650 lbs. to show and sell at the Hudsonville Community Fair. Dairy feeder calves that meet the specified weight requirements will be shown and sold based on their live weight at the time of fair weigh-in. It is suggested that feeder calves be born around April 15 of the current fair year to obtain the proper fair weight requirements.

10. Any dairy feeder calf that does not meet the specified weight requirements will not be shown or sold at the Hudsonville Community Fair. Underweight dairy feeder calves will be sent home immediately, and the livestock member will be responsible for transporting those animals off the grounds and for their sale and/or processing arrangements.

11. All dairy feeder calves must be double tied with one halter and one neck rope while in their pens.

12. Dairy feeder calf animals are not allowed to leave the grounds prior to the time posted by the Hudsonville Fair Board. Dairy feeder calf transportation is the responsibility of the buyer. All dairy feeder calves must be signed out by the hauler and a designated representative of the committee prior to leaving the grounds.

**Learning Objective:** To encourage youth to develop and enhance their skills and knowledge in animal science.

### Section 1 – MARKET LAMB

- These rules are in addition to the Market Livestock General Rules & Youth Club Guidelines.
- A member must be 8-19 years old by January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current fair year to complete a lamb project. Pen availability is limited and there may be a waiting list to show and sell a lamb project at the Hudsonville Community Fair (refer to the Hudsonville Livestock Lottery Rules).
- All lambs will need proof of being tagged by a specific date/time. Fair tags will be provided by the Hudsonville Livestock Committee. All lambs are required to have a scrapies tag in order to show and sell at the Hudsonville Community Fair. Scrapies tag are the responsibility of the livestock club member. Scrapies tags and fair tags are to be the only tags in your projects ears and must be in place before unloading your lamb project at the fair.
- A market livestock member may tag in a minimum of one lamb or a maximum of three lambs and only a maximum of two lambs per member can be weighed in at the fair to be shown and sold.
- If a family has more than one market livestock member showing lambs, they may tag in a spare for all immediate family members which must be designated at tag-in. If a family is going to have more than one spare lamb for multiple family members, each spare must be designated to specific family members. In no case shall the total number of lambs (including a spare) be more than three per member.
- All breeds of market lambs can be shown, and lambs may be wethers or ewes.
- If a market livestock member elects to show two lambs of the same sex and both animals are in the same market weight class, the member can designate another Hudsonville Community Fair market livestock club member to show one of the animals in that market weight class.
- Lambs must weigh 90 lbs. or more to show and sell at the fair. Lambs that meet the specified weight requirements will be shown and sold based on their live weight at the time of fair weigh-in.
- Any lamb that does not meet the specified weight requirements will not be shown or sold at the Hudsonville Community Fair. Underweight lambs will be sent home immediately, and the livestock member will be responsible for transporting those animals off the grounds and for their sale and/or processing arrangements.
- All lambs must be slick shorn for exhibit at the fair.
- Lambs are not allowed to leave the grounds prior to the time posted by the Hudsonville Fair Board. All transportation of lambs must be coordinated with the Hudsonville Livestock Committee. All lambs must be signed out by the hauler and a designated representative of the committee prior to leaving the grounds.

# Department 8 – YOUTH CLUBS GOATS

## Guidelines for Goats

- Youth goat declaration forms are due to the coordinator by August 1
- All Trucks, Cattle Trucks use 40<sup>th</sup> Avenue Entrance – You may bring in goat exhibits on Sunday of fair during hours of 5:30 P.M. to 8:30 P.M. or on Monday of fair by 11 A.M. No Entries released until Saturday at 6:30 pm. (leaving early forfeits premiums)**
- A project animal must be in the possession of the member at least eight (8) weeks prior to exhibiting. An exception would be kids born to a project animal.
- ¾ of all care, fitting, and training shall be done by the members.
- All show preparations at the fair shall be done by members (not by adults).
- A member must enter showmanship to receive premiums for confirmation classes.
- A member may receive only 1 premium per class.
- Goats shown in open class may not be shown in youth classes
- Any member may not show more than 7 animals.
- A member enrolling in the goat projects for the first time may not have more than two (2) project animals.
- Members under 8 years old may show only on a non-competitive basis and may receive no premiums
- A member who has participated in "novice showmanship" for 2 or more years must go to "junior showmanship" (skip first year showmanship).
- First year showmanship Class members are not eligible for Super Showmanship competition.
- Club herd shall consist of 4 animals owned by at least 2 different members.
- All market wethers, dairy types and pygmy goats must be dehorned.
- No bucks may be used as a project animal.
- All animals entered in any milking doe Class must be fully milked out within fourteen hours of the goat show. Each animal must be verified as milked out by the Goat Coordinator. Any exceptions must be approved by the Goat Coordinator prior to milk-out.
- Any meat/dairy cross must be shown in meat breed classes and not in dairy breed classes.
- Dress code change for 2023- Members should wear a clean shirt with sleeves, tucked neatly into their pants. Shirts should be white for dairy goats and any color for meat or fiber goats. Pants should be clean and free of holes. Jeans are acceptable for all breeds or dairy members may wear white pants and meat and fiber members may wear dark pants. All members should wear boots or leather shoes.

## **Department 10 – YOUTH CLUBS MARKET HOG**

**Learning Objective:** To encourage youth to develop and enhance their skills and knowledge in animal science.

#### **Section 1 - MARKET HOG**

1. These rules are in addition to the Market Livestock General Rules & Youth Club Guidelines.
2. A member must be 8-19 years old by January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current fair year to complete a hog project. Pen availability is limited and there may be a waiting list to show and sell a hog at the Hudsonville Community Fair (refer to the Hudsonville Livestock Lottery Rules).
3. All hogs must be castrated at the time of tagging.
4. All hogs will need proof of being tagged by a specific date/time. Fair tags will be provided by the Hudsonville Livestock Committee. All hogs are required to have a Premise ID or 840 Tag in order to show and sell at the Hudsonville Community Fair. Premise ID/840 Tags are the responsibility of the livestock club member. Premise ID/840 & fair tags are to be the only tags in your projects ears and they must be in place before unloading your hog project at the fair.
5. A market livestock member may tag in a minimum of one hog or a maximum of three hogs and only a maximum of two hogs per member can be weighed in at the fair to be shown and sold.
6. If a family has more than one market livestock member showing hogs, they may tag in a spare for all immediate family members which must be designated at tag-in. If a family is going to have more than one spare hog for multiple family members, each spare must be designated to specific family members. In no case shall the total number of hogs (including a spare) be more than three per member.

7. All breeds of market hogs can be shown, and hogs must be barrows or gilts.
8. If a market livestock member elects to show two hogs of the same sex and both animals are in the same market weight class, the member can designate another Hudsonville Community Fair market livestock club member to show one of the animals in that market weight class.
9. Hogs must weigh between 220 lbs. and 320 lbs. to show and sell at fair. Hogs that meet the specified weight requirements will be shown and sold based on their live weight at the time of fair weigh-in.
10. Any hog that does not meet the specified weight requirements will not be shown or sold at the Hudsonville Community Fair. Underweight or Overweight hogs will be sent home immediately, and the livestock member will be responsible for transporting those animals off the grounds and for their sale and/or processing arrangements.
11. All hogs that are clipped must have a hair length no shorter than ½ inch. Any hogs rejected at the processing plant must be replaced and the market livestock member will be responsible for the cost of the replacement.
12. Hogs are not allowed to leave the grounds prior to the time posted by the Hudsonville Fair Board. All transportation of hogs will be arranged by the Hudsonville Livestock Committee by designated trucks in accordance with being terminal for fair hogs.

- 12) Cavies/pocket pets are not required to stay on fairgrounds.
- 13) Parents/Spectators May NOT speak to or approach the judge or judging table during the show.
- 14) You can declare 10 rabbits/cages, any changes or removal of cages/rabbits needed must be told to the rabbit superintendent by the Wednesday before fair. Failure to do so may result in a reduction in allowable entries for the next year.

# Department 22 – YOUTH CLUBS DOGS & CATS

## Dog Project Guidelines – Hudsonville Fair Dog Committee

1. Project animals must be healthy and have met all inoculation regulations including rabies and DHLPP. Proof must be provided upon request.
2. Proper care and treatment of animals must be accorded whenever dogs are on the premises of Hudsonville fairgrounds. Shade and fresh water should be available to all dogs and every effort to keep the dog comfortable should be made. Crates or x-pens are recommended for dogs while they are waiting to go in the ring. Dogs must be attended at all times even when they are in crates or x-pens.
3. Members are responsible for project animal control whenever at a youth club function. Any dog showing aggression toward a person or another animal at the fair will be removed from the grounds and not be eligible to show at that fair. If a dog is asked to leave on two or more occasions it will not be allowed back at a Hudsonville fair event.
4. No excessive training is allowed at the fairgrounds. No correction or training is allowed in the ring. Members training or correcting in the ring will be disqualified. Excessive roughness or correction of dogs at any time will not be tolerated.
5. Judges or coordinators can dismiss members from fairs, matches and shows if rules on care, control and treatment are not being followed.
6. Appropriate leads and collars will be used in the show ring. This means a buckle collar for agility, a breed appropriate collar for showmanship and a buckle or choke collar for obedience and rally. No harnesses, retractable leads, easy halt or gentle leader allowed.
7. Showmanship classes will be entered according to the age of the youth club member as of January 1, except 1<sup>st</sup> year members 9 – 13 may choose 1<sup>st</sup> year or age class.
8. After three qualifying scores at any level in Agility the member must either move up to the next level the next show year OR if they wish to remain at the same level may do so on a non-competitive basis (A, B and C only and not eligible for placing ribbons) They MUST notify both the coordinator for that fair and the judge. A qualifying score is 85 and above.
9. Sub-novice A obedience class is for 1<sup>st</sup> year obedience members only with a dog that they trained themselves. Sub-novice B obedience class is for 2<sup>nd</sup> year obedience members and above or 1<sup>st</sup> year members using a dog trained by someone else. After three qualifying scores at any level in obedience the member must move up the next show year. If they wish to remain at the same level they may do so on a non-competitive basis (A, B or C only and not eligible for placing ribbons) they must notify both the coordinator for that fair and the judge. A qualifying score is 170 or above with at least 50 percent in each exercise.
10. After three qualifying scores at any level in rally the member must move up to the next level the next show year. A qualifying score is 70 or above.
12. Dress code: Dress should be business casual with no denim or logos. Shoes should be flat, close toed shoes. Shirts and shorts should be knee length or longer. Modest athletic attire can be worn for agility only.
13. Pre-registration forms must be turned in to the project coordinator by the deadline. Members wishing to switch dogs after that date must notify the Hudsonville fair dog project coordinator immediately to ask permission from the Hudsonville Fair dog committee to make the change.
14. One person, one dog (except for 5 to 7 year olds) Members may show more than one dog if they have done the training, but may not share dogs with another member. Only one dog per class. Dogs shown in the past 12 months by another person (in any venue such as AKC, UKC, etc.) in obedience, rally or agility are not eligible to be shown.
15. No dogs under 6 months old allowed except for the leader and service dog classes. Dogs must be at least one year old for agility classes.
16. Members who show two years as a non-competitive youth club member must go in their age class for showmanship. 1<sup>st</sup> year showmanship is for those who have not shown anywhere prior to the current year. Once a member has shown in their age group in a year, they may not move back to 1<sup>st</sup> year showmanship however they may show in 1<sup>st</sup> year showmanship (if eligible) for the entire summer.
17. No females in season allowed to show in any class.
18. All exercises for each class must be attempted in order to complete the class and receive a premium for the class.
19. A qualifying score is an A, a non-qualifying score is a B and a DQ is a C.

### Guidelines for Cats

1. No female that is in heat, an obviously pregnant cat or cats with litter are to be exhibited. Mixed breeds and purebred cats will show together unless numbers in classes warrant separation.
2. Short hair is coat 1" or less. Long hair is more than 1" in length.
3. Member's cat may be purebred or household pet.
4. All cats shown at the fair must have a certificate stating that they have had the following inoculations – rabies and distemper, calias, and rhinotrach (Feline 3 in 1). It is highly recommended that cats also have the feline leukemia and pneumatis inoculations.
5. Cats are to be brought to the fair in a well ventilated carrier suitable for the size of the cat. On the day of judging, cats are to be exhibited and taken home the same day.
6. Animals must be able to be handled by owner and on a leash.
7. All cats must have their nails clipped or be declawed. (A safety factor for member and judge.)
8. A cat will be marked down if any of the following are found by the judge:
  - a. Knots in the hair.
  - b. Ear mites, fleas or lice.
  - c. Unhealthy or unthrifty general appearance.
9. Judging will include: general appearance and condition, temperament and proper handling, hair coat, paws, nails, body build.
10. An exhibitor can show up to 2 cats/kittens, but he/she may not have more than 1 entry per class.
11. An exhibitor must be present while judging takes place.
12. An exhibitor's attire should be neat and clean. The show dress code includes a light colored long sleeved shirt or show jacket and dark colored pants or jeans.
13. Showmanship is required in order to show in regular class.
